The daily routine of the men at the Post is as follows: First call at 6:30 a.m., after which they fall in for roll call at 6:45; callsthenics on the parade grounds from 7:00 to 7:15; breakfast, 7:30; drill starts at 8:00 and lasts until 1:45; dinner, 12:15; instruction period from 1:15 to 3:30; recreation period from 1:15 to 3:30; recreation period from 1:15 to consist of the encand on anything they care to do as long as they stay at the Post. The Post consists of the ercreation hall, the open-air pavilion, and 20 feet east and north of the recreation hall.

At 5:00 the men fall in for retreat, and supper is at 5:30 after the post of the parameters of t

At 5:00 the men fall in for retreat, and supper is at 5:30 after which the men are free to do as they please for the evening. Those who sleep at the Post are required to be in by 10 p.m., at which time the lights are turned out. Those who sleep at home are required to be in bed by 12:00. This rule is enforced by two M.P.'s who are on duty at night. There are also guards stationed at the Post at all hours to keep civilians away from the Post and to keep the men there when they are supposed to be on duty.

# Interesting Information On Company 'C' **Presented By Truman**

We got into camp about five o'clock Wednesday night. That night we were assigned to our tents, and issued what equipment we needed, which consisted of a steel cot, a mattress, a comforter, four sheets, a pillow, two pillow-cases and an oil stove for each tent.

Five men were assigned to each tent. The tents have board floors and are boarded up about three feet on each side and are screened from there to the top. There is a large bath house and a mess hall that will seat 200 men. This is the place where church is held

is the place where church is held every Sunday, We didn't do much Thursday, but clean up the tents and level the company street. Friday we went out in the field and began training. The morning was spent in marching and the manual of arms. The afternoon was spent in listening to lectures by Major Godferson on personal hygiene, Discussing briefly the months

listening to lectures by Major Godferson on personal hygiene.

Discussing briefly the months of special training Lieut. Evan Pickett admitted it was no easy proposition, but there were definite commensations in spite of hard work and long hours. Grouped in a class of over 300 bringing together young men from every state in the Union, it meant gruelling study and training long hours every day, and constant worry in view of the fact that hundreds were being rejected because of major or minor disqualifications.

Part of the compensations came however in the privilege thus given of visiting parts of the United States which held for him intense interest, as well as for the other Washington county boys. Going back to school over the southern route through New Mexico, Colorado and across the southern states, they found Camp Belvoir located less than three miles from famous old Mt. Vernon along the beautiful Potomac river, and just 20 miles from Washington, D. C. The occasional brief hours off duty afforded opportunity to visit places of national importance. Returning over the northern route to Utah opportunity to visit places of na-tional importance. Returning over the northern route to Utah brought him over the general course of the Old Pioneer Trail and this added thrills he had not anticipapted receiving at the pres-

He plans to leave the first of next week to report at Camp Gruber, Oklahoma.
